C.L.E.A.N. (CONDUCIVE, LITTER-FREE, ECO-FRIENDLY AND AMBIENT NEIGHBORHOOD)

Title of the Practice:

C.L.E.A.N. (Conducive, Litter-Free, Eco-Friendly and Ambient Neighborhood)

Objectives of the Practice:

The C.L.E.A.N. Project has been established by the institution:

- To promote self-discipline and positive thinking towards the environment by inculcating eco-friendly habits.
- To ensure a healthy and conducive learning environment.
- To have a litter-free zone around the campus.
- To sensitize the local residents on the need to maintain healthy surroundings.
- To awaken an environment-friendly consciousness in students and other stakeholders.

The underlying principles of this practice lie in the idea of fostering a sustainable and harmonious coexistence between the community and the environment. The C.L.E.A.N. initiative is grounded in principles that go beyond just cleanliness and extend to holistic environmental stewardship.

Context:

The idea germinated with the intention to foster an environment of responsibility in youth. The college realized that higher education necessarily needs to address such key issues. By awakening an environment-friendly consciousness among students and other stakeholders, the college hopes to create love and care for the environment in the students of the institution. The college believes that the students would be the agents of change in the society.

The Practice:

To achieve the goal set forth above, the institution conceptualized the C.L.E.A.N. Project. More than just a project, C.L.E.A.N. is envisioned as a way of life to be imprinted in the minds of our students through action. The college drafted a Waste Management Policy and used the institution's two vehicles of change, the **Nisarg Club and** the **NSS Unit**, to execute the following initiatives:

- Conducting cleanliness drives in the vicinity of the college campus and around localities around students' residences under Swachh Bharat Abhiyan.
- 2. Placing separate bins to segregate wet and dry waste around the campus.
- 3. Cleaning of the campus by Multi-Tasking Staff twice a day.
- 4. Cleaning of the surrounding localities around campsites during NSS camps.
- 5. Making and distributing cloth and paper bags to local residents and the general public, free of cost.
- 6. Creating awareness drives, articulating the harmful effects of usage of plastic bags, water and electricity wastage, etc.
- 7. Maintaining a nursery of medicinal, ornamental and floral plants, through donations from teachers and students.

Role of Nisarg Club

As part of its activities, the **Nisarg Club** conducted seminars, participated in street plays, and organised exhibitions on Goa's unique biodiversity, with exhibits on an array of medicinal plants.

Role of NSS Unit

As part of its activities, the **NSS Unit** conducted anti-plastic drives, whereby NSS volunteers gather plastic garbage in their neighbourhood and get the same to the college from where it is sent for recycling. The NSS Unit has successfully collected and sent more than 250 Kg of plastic waste for recycling.

Evidence of Success:

As a consequence of C.L.E.A.N. as a practice, the campus is litter-free. The encouragement given to the students by the teachers has motivated students to segregate garbage not only at the college but also at home. There has also been a revival of green cover in the places where plantation drives have been conducted stabilizing the biosphere and having a positive impact on surrounding flora and fauna.

The C.L.E.A.N. project has also led to the students voluntarily participating in cleanliness drives organized by the NSS unit and other associations. Positive changes are seen in the mindset of the students as well as the residents. Due to this project, the local residents have started using cloth bags and have also told the students that they have reduced the usage of plastic bags. The college campus is plastic-free and the usage of plastic by staff and students is discouraged by the college.

A group of college alumni have gone ahead and launched their own NGO, **Naya Swarg**.

Problems encountered and resources required:

The problems encountered are as follows:

- As students come from different strata of society, making them realize the value of cleanliness and the need for environmental conservation as their duty is a major difficulty encountered.
- The saplings at some tree plantation sites were destroyed by unscrupulous third parties and the incident was reported to the concerned authorities.
- The problems encountered also pertain to the attitude of the public. Many people find it convenient to use plastic bags, which are readily available in the market rather than carrying a cloth bag.

• While students were distributing cloth bags, some locals showed indifference and were unwilling to entertain them on their premises.

The resources required are as follows:

- Waste disposal bins and containers for proper segregation and disposal of waste.
- Saplings of native tree species suitable for the local environment and climate.
- Informational materials, pamphlets, and signage promoting cleanliness and the importance of tree plantation.

Notes

This practice helps college students by making them environment-conscious. With more than 2,000 students in the college and school using the campus every day, the C.L.E.A.N. campaign can reach out to almost a similar number of families in the locality.

More importantly, with the C.L.E.A.N. project, the institution was able to influence students, right from Shishuvatika (pre-primary-level) to the graduate level within the same campus. Getting access to this diverse age group across a wide socio-economic spectrum is something that very few colleges across India have access to.
